

Personal Discipleship Inventory

Establishing a Baseline for Growth

Wherefore let us know nothing more profitable for ourselves than to examine ourselves daily, every day of our life reviewing that dubious life, and keeping account of our words and thoughts, and shuddering at human life, to ponder without ceasing the aforesaid end of that roadway, that is of our life, while we spurn the pleasures of the world.

The instrument that follows – the Personal Discipleship Inventory – has been developed to help pastors and church leaders sustain ongoing growth and fruitfulness in their walk with and work for the Lord. It consists of three parts:

- 1. An *outline paradigm* for thinking about the life of faith: In the Personal Discipleship Inventory, the life of faith is conceived of as consisting of three facets vision, disciplines, and outcomes. Each is explained in its place.
- 2. A series of assessment scales to help you determine where you stand in relation to the paradigm of the life of faith presented in the Inventory. Use these assessments yourself, and ask a soul-friend to complete the Inventory for you as well, asking your soul-friend responding to provide his assessments in each area. Review your assessments together so that you can get a better picture of the baseline for ongoing growth that this Inventory can help you to establish.
- 3. Guidelines for setting goals so that you can grow in the life of faith.

Completing the Personal Discipleship Inventory at least annually can be an effective means both of establishing a baseline for the life of discipleship and monitoring growth in your walk with and work for the Lord. Follow the instructions carefully, and respond to the questions with prayer and honest reflection.

Paul exhorts us to "Look carefully then how you walk," (Eph. 5.15). Our time is not our own; all our time belongs to the Lord. The Personal Discipleship Inventory can help you make the most of your time, as work for improvement in each of the areas of your life – vision, disciplines, and outcomes.

Introduction

The questions that follow are designed to help you collect your thoughts, feelings, and impressions with respect to the vision that motivates and guides you in your daily life, the disciplines by which you pursue that vision, and the outcomes that indicate progress day by day. Completing this assessment can help you identify areas of needed improvement and growth. Complete each statement by circling the number that best describes your sense of agreement or disagreement with the statement. Ask a soul-friend to do the same. When you have finished all 15 statements, follow the directions at the end of the Inventory.

I. Vision

Every worldview is driven by its vision of ultimate reality – that which is finally and wholly beautiful, good, true, and most to be desired. The Christian's vision is lodged in a realm of unseen things (Heb. 11.1), things hoped for and sought after, and it includes our vision of Christ and His Kingdom, the Church, our salvation, and our individual callings and legacy.

1. I have a clear and growing vision of unseen things above, where Christ is seated in heavenly places (Colossians 3.1-3).

The Fellowship of Ailbe Personal Discipleship Inventory Tabulation When you have completed this survey, add up the total score that you gave yourself in each of the three sections of the Inventory (each section separately). Enter those scores here: Vision Disciplines Outcomes Now, double each of those scores to achieve a percentile indicator of your assessment of the state of your discipleship in each area at this time. Put that percentiles to the right of each score above. You now have a reflection and estimate of the state of your walk with and work for the Lord - in the areas of vision, disciplines, and outcomes - expressed in terms of a percentage. For example, you may have discovered that your overall estimate of the state of your vision of the Christian life amounts to, let's say, 60%. This means that, overall, you agree, although not strongly (60%, or 6, being just past the middle of the 1 to 10 scale), with the statements in the Inventory concerning the state of your vision. This would indicate that there is some room for improvement, and you should be able to identify some particular shapes that improvement might take, what next steps you could take to to improve your score the next time around. Now compare your results on the Personal Discipleship Inventory with those of your soul friend. Do any common observations appear? Review carefully your answers to each of the statements in the Inventory, as well as the percentages you ascertained above. Under the headings below, indicate areas where you would most like to see growth in your walk with and work for the Lord, based on your observations in this Personal Discipleship Inventory. Be as specific as you can: Vision Disciplines Outcomes Who will be your soul-friend(s) as you take up the task of addressing these areas of growth? How will you look to your soul-friend to help you grow?
