Monday, 14 January 2019 Ephesians 5:15-21

Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the best use of the time, because the days are evil. Therefore do not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery, but be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with your heart, giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ.

I wonder if this entire passage depends upon my being filled with the Spirit? The Spirit is going to guide me into the best use of my time as I make wise decisions. My life will be formed by the Psalms, by hymns, by spiritual songs, by an attitude with is one of thanksgiving and praise. My relationships with other saints will be shaped by submission to them as an act of reverence to Christ.

Tuesday, 15 January 2019 Ephesians 6:13-18

Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand firm. Stand therefore, having fastened on the belt of truth, and having put on the breastplate of righteousness, and, as shoes for your feet, having put on the readiness given by the gospel of peace. In all circumstances take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming darts of the evil one; and take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God, praying at all times in the Spirit, with all prayer and supplication. To that end, keep alert with all perseverance, making supplication for all the saints,

What is a sword? A weapon. Offensive, defensive or both, a broad variety of designs from claymore to rapier. One universal characteristic is that each type needs the hands of a skilled swordsman to be effective. The Word, the sword of the Spirit, is sharper than any two-edged sword (Heb 4:12), but is useless, if I am not intimately familiar with it. I need to study my weapon, to know when to use the smashing power of the claymore or the delicate piercing of the rapier.

Praise the LORD. The Spirit is a powerful teacher and coach.

Wednesday, 16 January 2019 Ephesians 6:13-18

Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand firm. Stand therefore, having fastened on the belt of truth, and having put on the breastplate of righteousness, and, as shoes for your feet, having put on the readiness given by the gospel of peace. In all circumstances take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming darts of the evil one; and take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God, praying at all times in the Spirit, with all prayer and supplication. To that end, keep alert with all perseverance, making supplication for all the saints,

Two significant occurrences of 'all.' "At all times" and "with all prayer and supplication;" summarizing 1 Thess. 5:16-18 and Phil. 4:4-7 with an exhortation to rejoice always thrown in for good measure. If the Holy Spirit guides my prayer, I will always start with rejoicing and glorifying the LORD, God, the Almighty. There's plenty of time for my anxieties and supplications.

Thursday, 17 January 2019 Philippians 1:18-22a

What then? Only that in every way, whether in pretense or in truth, Christ is proclaimed, and in that I rejoice. Yes, and I will rejoice, for I know that through your prayers and the help of the Spirit of Jesus Christ this will turn out for my deliverance, as it is my eager expectation and hope that I will not be at all ashamed, but that with full courage now as always Christ will be honored in my body, whether by life or by death. For, to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain. If I am to live in the flesh, that means fruitful labor for me.

It is most interesting that Paul links the prayers of the saints through the power of the Holy Spirit in a life or death situation. There is no hint of the self-centered Saul of Tarsus, a Hebrew of the Hebrews. No, he comes to the saints of Phillipi to lift him up for the strength to continue his witness in either outcome. One of the lessons to me is to be open and willing to seek the support of the congregation with whom I worship. If the Apostle Paul needs to ask for support, what makes me think I can manage on my own?

Friday, 18 January 2019 Philippians 2:1-2

So if there is any encouragement in Christ, any comfort from love, <u>any</u> <u>participation in the Spirit</u>, any affection and sympathy, complete my joy by being of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind.

Again, this passage as others looked at before, focuses on the centrality of the Spirit between the LORD, God, the Almighty and His Bride in the yet to be raptured. For example, anytime another saint and I are not of one mind on an issue or a course of action; the Holy Spirit needs to be approached for direction. His counsel needs to be sought in agape, not in an attitude of "Lord, show my brother where he is wrong."

For we are the circumcision, <u>who worship by the Spirit of God</u> and glory in Christ Jesus and put no confidence in the flesh—

My worship must be guided by the Spirit, not, as is so prevalent in many churches, by what is attractive and will suck an audience in. I must remember that Worship of the LORD, God, the Almighty must be directed from me to Him. Thanksgivings have an essential place in a time of Worship but in a position behind a time of acknowledging the worth of the LORD, acknowledging who He is and reciting His infinite values. A time of confession is often overlooked in popular church services, at best replaced by a public confession. What has happened to a time of falling on our knees, publicly confessing that we have sinned against the LORD in word and deed? Then a time of thanksgivings, sharing the many ways the LORD has blessed us in every aspect of our lives, appropriately placed after praise and confession.

Lord's Day, 20 January 2019 Psalm 119:26

When I told of my ways, you answered me; teach me your statutes! This is an exciting sequence, Lord. The first step is for me to recognize and confess the error of my ways. Then, once I am fully comprehending my need, You will answer through Your statutes, Your Word to instruct and lead me. Give me an understanding of my need for forgiveness and teaching.

Prayer of the week, based on Paul's prayer in:Colossians 1:9-14 For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you and asking God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all spiritual wisdom and understanding.
