He ascended into heaven
and sitteth at the right hand of God the Father almighty.
From thence He shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

The Ministry of the Word

Isaiah 53.10-12

The Leader will read the passage for today, or ask another to read it.

Leader:

We typically think of Isaiah 53 as prophesying the death of Jesus for our sins. And so it does, in verses

- 1-9. But verses 10-12 look to what follows His death His glorious resurrection from the dead! It pleased God to "put *Him* to grief" and to "make *His* soul an offering for sin." But the story, as we know, doesn't end there. Let's read again Isaiah 53.10, especially paying attention to the part from "He shall see *His* seed..." to the end (someone shall read).
- 1. How does it appear from these verses that the death of Christ is not the end?

The resurrection of Jesus is clearly in view here, and God is making certain promises to Him, about seeing offspring and prolonging His days. He also says that the "pleasure of the LORD shall prosper in His hand" (v. 10). We can assume that the pleasure of the Lord is what the Lord promised His people in the covenant He made with Abram. Let's review those promises in Genesis 12.1-3 (someone read).

- 2. How would you summarize the Lord's pleasure, based on these promises?
- 3. How does Jesus, in His resurrection, fulfill those promises? Read 2 Corinthians 1.20.

Realizing the pleasure of the Lord and the fullness of His covenant promises requires additional "labor" (Is. 53.11) beyond that which Jesus has already done, including what is mentioned in the rest of verse 11.

4. How is Jesus laboring now? How do we benefit from that labor? Do we have a role in that labor (cf. Jn. 14.12)?

Let's read verse 12 again. God promises to reward His Servant with a "portion" and with "spoil". That spoil, as Jesus explained, comes from His plundering of the kingdom of Satan (cf. Matt. 12.22-30). We have the privilege of being with Jesus in this great work, so it is important we understand what that work requires. Basically, our work of plundering involves living for Jesus, Who lives in us, walking the paths of obedience in every area of our lives, and being His witnesses. He promises to help us in this, so let us take up our "labor" and gain the "portion" and "spoil" which the Lord has for us in Christ Jesus.

Meditate in silence on the teaching of Isaiah 53.10-12.
