Preparation: Psalm 84.11

**Silent Meditation** 

For the LORD God is a sun and shield; The LORD will give grace and glory; No good thing will He withhold From those who walk uprightly.

Call to Worship Psalm 84.9, 10, 1

Leader:

O God, behold our shield, And look upon the face of Your anointed. For a day in Your courts is better than a thousand.

All:

How lovely is Your tabernacle, O LORD of hosts!

Lord of hosts, my prayer receiving, hear me, help me by Your grace! In Your courts I stand believing; turn to me Your glorious face! Lord, our sun, our shield, our glory, no good thing will You deny to those who proclaim Your story, and who on Your grace rely.

O Lord Jesus, thank You for calling us to come to You, and to come through You and in Your Name to worship our God and heavenly Father. We pause in our coming before You, Lord, to let Your Spirit search us, that we may confess our sins, repent, and be cleansed. **Hear our silent confessions, O Lord.**

Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven,

Whose sin is covered.

Blessed is the man to whom the LORD does not impute iniquity,

And in whose spirit there is no deceit.

All:

Thanks be to God!

#### Hymn of Assurance

Psalm 85.10, 11

(Lyons: O Worship the King)

In Jesus God's grace and truth are combined; both goodness and peace in Him do we find. Truth springs from the earth as He walks in our midst, and righteousness flows from the heav'ns as a gift.

# Prayers of Praise and Thanksgiving

Psalm 85.1-3

Leader:

LORD you have been favorable to Your land;

All:

You have brought back the captivity of Jacob.

You have forgiven the iniquity of Your people;

You have covered all their sin.

You have taken away all Your wrath;

You have turned from the fierceness of Your anger.

All may offer prayers of praise and thanks to the Lord. At the end of these prayers, the Leader shall **lead the** people in praying the Lord's Prayer.

#### Offerings to the Lord

Leader:

Let us now bring our offerings to honor the Lord and edify one another by His Word: a passage of Scripture which has been particularly helpful; a brief word of praise for some grace of God bestowed; an observation from creation which revealed the glory of the Lord; a word of appreciation for some aspect of the beauty, goodness, or truth of the Lord.

When as many as like have shared, the Leader shall pray:

We give You thanks and praise, O Lord, and offer ourselves to You in our confession of faith together (all together, saying the Apostles' Creed):

I believe in God, the Father almighty,
Maker of heaven and earth,
and in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord,
Who was conceived by the Holy Ghost,
born of the virgin Mary,
suffered under Pontius Pilate,
was crucified, dead, and buried;

He descended into hell.

The third day He rose again from the dead.

He ascended into heaven
and sitteth at the right hand of God the Father almighty.

From thence He shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Ghost,
the holy catholic Church,
the communion of saints,
the forgiveness of sins,
the resurrection of the body,
and the life everlasting. Amen.

Leader:

Will You not revive us again, That Your people may rejoice in You?

All:

Show us your mercy, LORD, And grant us Your salvation.

# The Ministry of the Word

2 Corinthians 2.13-17

The Leader will read the passage for today, or ask another to read it.

Let's recall the specific requests Paul made for the Ephesians – and for us – in his prayer in Ephesians 1.15-23, Paul prayed:

- That the eyes of our heart might be opened
- That we might know the hope of His glory
- That we might know the hope of His Kingdom
- That we might lay hold on the Lord Himself, our great Inheritance of faith
- That we might realize more of the power of Christ and His salvation

Paul has been outlining a vision of the unseen things that are so much a part of true faith in Jesus Christ. The writer of Hebrews reminds us (11.1) that "faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." The more we focus on and engage these unseen realities, the more our faith will increase, and more evidence of true and lively faith will be visible in us.

But what evidence should we expect from learning to live from the vantage point of unseen things? Paul's prayer in Ephesians 1 ends with a vision of Jesus Christ, "filling all things in all things." When we see Jesus in His glory, lay hold on Him as our inheritance, and draw on the power of His indwelling Spirit, we become more like Jesus in every way. And as Jesus fills us with Himself, He overflows through us to fill the world we inhabit, beginning in our own Personal Mission Fields.

In our text for today, Paul says that we become "the fragrance of Christ." Let's think about that:

1. Why is "fragrance" a good way of thinking about Christ's Presence in and through us?

Paul says that the "whiff of Jesus", so to speak, is to some people the "aroma of life *leading* to life." We carry the fragrance of life itself, and to those who have eternal life, this pleasing aroma helps them to want more.

2. What can we do to be more consistently the aroma of life leading to life to our fellow believers?

To others, who do not know the Lord, the fragrance of Jesus in us can be an "aroma of death *leading* to death." For some people, no matter how sweet the fragrance of Jesus is, they will not receive it, because it brings into view their life of being dead in trespasses and sins. The fragrance of Jesus brings out the stench of death in them.

3. Should the fragrance of Jesus also have this effect on us who believe? Explain.

We can't make everyone love the fragrance of Jesus. But we must not fail to emit that fragrance in all our words and deeds, so that Jesus, and the fragrance of Him, fills all the roles, relationships, and responsibilities of our daily lives. Jesus is alive from the dead, in the full beauty and sweet fragrance of everlasting life. And we are seated with Him, seeing Him in His glory, seeking His Kingdom, drawing on His power, and going to our world to fill it with His Presence, promise, and power.

We fear You; let glory and grace fill our land.

Surely His salvation is near to those who fear Him, that glory may dwell in our land.

Thanks be to God!
